


As a parent I feel welcome within the school community.




Our school has a positive reputation in the community.




I feel my culture and others are valued and recognised in the school community.




My child/children feel happy at school.






The school provides effective methods of communication.




I am happy with the learning opportunities, experiences and activities my child is receiving at school.




The school provides effective methods of communication when reporting to parents on student progress and achievement.






I would prefer to pay a one off 'activity contribution' to cover additional costs throughout the year rather than paying per activity. Eg swimming fees 75 responses




The homework my child/children receive is purposeful to their learning needs.




I believe it is important for my child to be assigned homework to complete every week by their classroom teacher








The school sets high expectations of learning for its students.




The school sets high expectations of behaviour for its students.






I receive sufficient information and communication from the Home and School Committee


