EL RANCHO CAMP

Excitement is building in the Senior school as preparation is underway for our bi-annual adventure to El Rancho. Camp is always a highlight on the school calendar as it is a fantastic opportunity for children to develop new skills, friendships and interests. After camp much of the learning back in the classroom will be centred around the experiences from camp. However, for many kids (and parents!) just the thought of sleeping away from home can provoke high anxiety. Some of the common worries about camp include:

SWEETS AT SCHOOL & DENTAL HEALTH

It has come to our attention that children are getting into the habit of bringing lollies and sweets to school to consume and share. At Boulcott we encourage healthy eating options for students at school so we ask students not to bring these items to school, this includes chewing and bubble gum.

In related news, we have received a report from the Bee Health Dental van that visited at the end of last year. During the two weeks spent at school they examined 312 students and treated 82 students for tooth decay. That's 26% of students with tooth decay!

Research has shown that children with oral health problems are more likely to have lower academic achievement and school attendance. One of the simplest and effective ways to reduce rates of tooth decay is to replace sugary drinks such as fizzy drinks, energy drinks,

sports drinks, fruit drinks and juices, flavoured milks and waters, powdered drinks and cordial with water or plain milk.

SCHOOL CHARTER & ANNUAL PLAN

Our new School Charter has been completed after collating and analysing all the feedback received from parents, teachers and students in 2018. This forms the direction for the school for the next 3 years. Included in the Charter is a more detailed plan for 2019. BOARD ELECTIONS

In the last newsletter you'll recall I invited parents who were interested in learning more about being a representative on our Board to attend our next meeting on Monday, 11 March. Since then, we have received details about another information session which is being run by New Zealand School Trustees Association. They are offering a new programme, **Kōrari**, which is designed to recognise the experience of existing trustees and help to encourage potential new trustees to come and find out what it really means to serve on a school Board.

People who want to understand what school governance looks like can come along and find out more. The hui will be facilitated by a regional adviser from NZSTA who will talk about the reality of being a trustee, the support and training that is available and encourage existing trustees to tell their story. For people who are keen to consider







standing for election, the programme can then offer a range of options to provide them with some learning opportunities, so that they can prepare for election and hopefully become well prepared to serve on the Board.

The Boulcott Board of Trustees encourages any parent interested in learning more about the role of a parent representative to attend this meeting at Hutt Valley High School, on Monday, 11 March at 6pm.

TEACHER PAID UNION MEETINGS

You will be aware that teachers are involved in a major campaign called It's Time - Kua Tae Te Wā to address issues created by at least a decade of under-resourcing of the education sector. These issues include the current teacher shortage, the under-valuing of teachers and principals, and the lack of resourcing for children with special needs. The campaign has a strong focus on seeking significant investment into the education sector to provide teachers with the time to teach and principals with the time to lead. This campaign includes the process to renew the collective agreements for teachers and principals.

As part of the campaign, primary teachers and principals went without two days' pay in 2018 to highlight the urgency of the crisis facing the compulsory education sector. We are now holding a further round of paid union meetings for all teachers who are covered by the Primary Teachers Collective Agreement and all principals covered by the Primary Principals Collective Agreement. These meetings are critical for all teachers and principals as they provide the opportunity for our profession to come together to discuss the current status of the campaign, the respective collective agreement negotiations and to determine next steps.

The decision to hold meetings during student contact time is not one we take lightly. However, it is urgent that the sector comes together to discuss ways to address the long-term systemic issues that are threatening to blow out class sizes and make it even harder to recruit and retain teaching staff.

To ensure the school remains open for instruction, Boulcott School teachers will be attending Paid Union Meetings on two seperate afternoons on Tuesday, 19 and Thursday, 21 March. This will ensure disruption to the classroom programme is minimised.
