Our Year 5/6 Kapa haka group participated in a wonderful Kapa haka exchange along with Eastern Hutt and Waterloo Schools. Jodi Mitchell and I had the privilege of attending this show, along with the Year 5/6 Kahikatea teachers: Melissa, Molly, Claire and Corrina. Our students performed incredibly well, with such fierce pride and respect for Te Ao Māori . Their set of songs included the use of poi as well as a stirring haka. Shared kai was enjoyed at the end of the performances giving our tamariki the opportunity to interact with students from the other two schools. Eastern Hutt School did a lovely job welcoming us all to their kura and our own Matua Whaitiri spoke on our behalf. It was such a great to be a part of such a fabulous event.

Staffing Update

We have very nearly finished finalising our teaching staff for 2025. We congratulate Nadine Raath who leaves us at the end of the year and has won a position at Belmont School for next year.

So far, we have two new classroom teachers starting with us - both will be working in Kōwhai team. Emma Collings joins us from Te Hapara School in Gisborne. Emma is a very experienced teacher and has recently returned from teaching overseas in China and Cambodia as well as many years teaching in New Zealand. Our second new appointment will be a familiar face to some of you as Erin Inglis has relieved at our school this year and this term has been working in Room 15 on Fridays. Erin worked for 4 years as a kaiako at Avalon Primary School and so is no stranger to the Hutt Valley. I am excited to welcome both of these teachers to our staff for 2025.

Lisa Hassell is going to be our Learning Support Teacher next year. She will be working with small groups of students who may need more support with their learning in Literacy or Maths. She will also work alongside our Learning Support Team (Teacher Aides) to assist our learners for whom English is a second language. Lisa is well placed to work in this role as she is a highly experienced, reflective teacher, with the capability and confidence to work with students from Years 1-6. Because Lisa will no longer be a classroom teacher for 2025, we have advertised her Year 2 position.

Diwali, celebrated on 31 October, marks an important Hindu festival symbolising light over darkness. The five-day event starts with Dhanteras and ends with Bhai Dooj, involving various rituals. Significantly, this festival spreads happiness and unity among families and communities globally. I had the pleasure of seeing students from Room 14 share with their class and me, a slideshow they had created all about Diwali. Thanks Yaniv, Maddie, Zuri and Ahren, it was very informative, you are obviously very proud of your Indian heritage and culture! Ka rawe.

Attendance

One of the things we are continuing to focus on this term is student attendance. You will hear us talking about this with you, with our students, and it remains a strong subject of conversation amongst teachers.

If a student misses one day of school every two weeks, they miss more than a whole year of school by 16 years of age. As a parent or caregiver, you, alongside our school, play a key role in building strong habits of regular school attendance. All students are legally required to attend school every day and it is a shared responsibility to make sure students attend and engage in learning from when they first start school. You must let the school know if your child is going to be absent or intends to be absent for a portion of the school term for whatever reason, like a tangi or medical procedure. Family holidays or taking time off for extracurricular activities (not organised by school) are not acceptable reasons for being absent and have to be marked as unjustified absences.

A connected school community that does everything to make sure students are attending, participating, and progressing in their education can play a pivotal role in raising attendance.

1. Regular attendance at school helps build and maintain a child's learning and positive daily habits and routines, as well as promoting their wellbeing by connecting them to their peers and learning new things.

2. We want our ākonga to thrive and be resilient and active members within their whānau and community.

3. Attendance matters and we can all work together to increase school attendance.


In April 2024, the Government announced a regular attendance target of 80 percent of students to be present for more than 90% of the term by 2030.

The Ministry of Education provides each school with an analysis of termly attendance data. Below is a summary for Boulcott School for Term 3, compared to Term 3 in 2023.




Please note: It is the parent's responsibility to come to the office and collect any medication at the end of the day if needed.



Parking safely near our school

Picking up and dropping tamariki off at school

Picking up and dropping tamariki off at school?

How you park and drive can protect them, or put them in danger.

Drivers and children need good visibility around schools to be able to see each other. Parking restrictions are in place for this reason - to protect our tamariki.

As a driver, you can help to reduce the risks:

- Park legally and safely at all times
- Do not exceed P5 or P10 time limits
- Park further away and walk with your child to or from the school gate
- If you need to turn around, find a safe place well away from the school gate
- Always slow down as you approach a busy school or pedestrian crossing
- Choose alternatives to driving allow your child to walk to school, start a walking school bus, or find another family to carpool with



Parking safely near schools

Stopping on broken yellow lines, across driveways, on a bus stop, and double parking are illegal and risky moves that endanger children and other pedestrians.

If you choose to stop or park illegally you risk receiving a fine.
