What a fantastic Wellington weekend! I hope you managed to get out and enjoy the sunshine as much as I did. It was perfect for a bit of a refresh.

As I write this piece for our newsletter one thing on top for me and probably many of you is Budget 2025. As far as education is concerned budget highlights include substantial funding for learning support at all levels, 25 new satellite learning support classrooms, funding of ORS students on a demand driven basis, a boost to Teacher Aide hours, an increase in specialist support, and a substantial increase in the number of Learning Support Coordinators.

While this funding still falls short of meeting all our learning support needs, it will hopefully have a hugely positive impact.

During NZ Support Staff Week two weeks ago, our school community came together to acknowledge the vital contributions of our support team. Classes created heartfelt thank you letters for our Learning Support staff, our efficient Office and Admin team, and our ever-helpful Caretaker. We are so fortunate to have such warm, friendly, and dedicated individuals who work tirelessly behind the scenes to support our community and, most importantly, our tamariki. We concluded the week with a lovely morning tea as a small token of our immense gratitude.

Over the last two weeks, I have had the privilege of a few new experiences. The first of which was a visit to Waiwhetu Marae. I went along with Jodi and Jo from our school and 14 other local Principals and their leaders. Unfortunately, Molly and Brigit were on their Kura Ahurea course , otherwise they would have joined us too. The visit was largely around whanaungatanga and leadership. We were welcomed onto the marae and had the opportunity to listen to Matiu Tahi talk about the History of Te Atiawa settlement and have many of our questions answered by him. Including quesions around Tikanga and kawa ō Te Ati Awa - Understanding what this means for our individual contexts.

We had a korero around how schools can grow authentic relationships with Waiwhetu and contribute to the community and enrich our own communities. We also learned about the best way to connect with Waiwhetu and the Rūnanga when we need cultural advice, guidance and support with our kura. It was a fabulous visit and great to make such meaningful connections.

The amazing second experience I had was attending, with 4 other staff members, a 3 day course on Structured Literacy. This was an intense three days and I learned so much. It is a pedagogy (way we teach) which we introduced in the Junior classes in 2021. We have seen the benefit of this method of teaching and so now teachers in the Middle and Senior school are going to be implementing it in their classes. Structured Literacy ensures that all learners, including those who may find literacy challenging, receive a clear and sequential pathway to becoming confident readers and writers. It focuses on how the English language works, providing children with the tools to decode (read) and encode (write) words effectively. A really worthwhile 3 days!

Last week 12 principals from our local primary and intermediate schools visited Boulcott to see how we do things at our kura. Two of our student leaders, Eden and Arthur, did an awesome job of sharing with them what they love about their school. I was very proud of both of them. The Principals were amazed by our incredible Kapa haka group (they watched as our tamariki were practising), with one principal commenting *"The Kapa haka was one of the best I have felt. Seriously good!".* The school leaders were also impressed with the lunchtime activities and resources we have on offer, and they enjoyed the artwork on display from our recent Tuakana Teina day. The whole visit reminded me of why I continue to love my job as Principal of this incredible school.

One part of the job that I don't enjoy so much is when we get complaints from our neighbours. I recently received one of these. The neighbour was upset, expressing that some parents are very problematic and causing real issues especially at afternoon pick up times. We've noticed a concerning trend in the afternoons with parking around the school, particularly with vehicles blocking driveways, parking on our berms, double parking, and stopping on yellow lines. This is creating a dangerous environment for our tamariki, especially in poor weather conditions. We understand the challenges of school pick-up, but the safety of our students must be our priority. We urge everyone to be considerate and thoughtful when parking to ensure the afternoon pick-up is safe for all. Over the next few weeks, you will see a variety of staff members outside school at 3pm wearing fluro vests and taking photos of cars that are parking dangerously and illegally. These photos will be forwarded to the police for ticketing purposes. We don't want to wait until there is a tragedy, before we take action. Thank you for your understanding.

Thank you all for your ongoing support of our school, I did also mention to our visiting tumuaki about what a strongly supportive community we have here at Boulcott. Have a wonderful week.


